Also, please note changed arrangements for Parish Council meetings as the Parish Council is now back to meeting on the first TUESDAY of each month except August and will now be meetings at the MEMORIAL HALL. As ever Residents are welcome to come along and speak in the public session and each meeting will start at 7.30pm.

The play in the park sessions over the Easter holiday were very well attended and two more sessions will be taking place at the recreation grounds on 8th August. You can book your child's place on the Chelmsford City Council website.

By the time you receive this magazine the Platinum Jubilee celebration will have taken place with a beacon lighting at Channels and tea and cakes at the Memorial Hall. Thanks to all those who have been involved in organising those events and let's hope the weather was fine!

The 'Digigo' roadshow took place in the Tufnell Hall car park at the beginning of June and you can find out more about this new on demand bus service further on in the magazine.

The Parish Council has continued to make representations on behalf of the community, including the recent licensing hearing regarding events at Wheeler's Farm, responding to the consultation regarding the proposed solar farm and the new Chelmsford Garden Community and also engaged in relation to the proposals to erect new electricity pylons which will follow the route of the B1008. You will recently have received a leaflet about the future of the Pavilion which is also printed further on in this magazine so if you still wish to make comments about the exciting plans to upgrade the building, please feel free to contact me.

In view of the many issues facing the Parish Council it was decided to postpone the acquisition of outdoor gym equipment and consider the issue again next year. However, the Parish Council has ordered the new goal ends for the tennis court and they are due to be installed in the summer.

Regarding the continuing issue of rat running, the Parish Council has now appointed a traffic consultant and it is hoped to be able to persuade Essex County Council to undertake an origin and destination survey with the aim of demonstrating the extent of the problem and as the County Council is data led will bring extra pressure to bear to find a solution to the issue.

Little Waltham Open Gardens and Classic Car Show - Sunday 3rd July 10.30 am to 4.30 pm.


Do join us for a really enjoyable day out.

DigiGo



New on-demand electric minibus service for residents

Residents in north-west Chelmsford areas can now access an exciting on-demand, fully electric minibus service called DigiGo. One of the first of its kind in the country, the service responds to demand rather than having set routes, with minibuses able to divert on and off journeys for passenger collection and drop off. DigiGo connects rural communities in north Chelmsford, including Felsted, Little Dunmow, Barnston, Leaden Roding, Good Easter, Pleshey, Great Waltham, Little Waltham and Great Leighs to popular locations such as Chelmer Valley Park & Ride, Broomfield Hospital, and Writtle University College. The new service operates seven days a week, from 7am to 10pm and caters for everyone; students, families, the elderly, and people travelling to work, with accessible minibuses available for people with disabilities, providing a flexible and environmentally friendly service for people who do not live close to public transport routes.

To book an on-demand journey, residents can download the TravelEssex planning app via their phone's app store or visit www.digigo.uk. After ordering, passengers can pay for their journey via the app and track the location of their minibus in real time. Tickets for the service can also be pre-booked up to seven days in advance. The Parish Council were pleased to host an information event for this service on 10th June and thanks to the Tufnell Hall for making their car park available.

Gardening Club



I am pleased to report that the Gardening Club held a successful Spring Flower Show in April. There were more entrants, many first time entrants, and a greater number of people who came to view the Show in the afternoon and share a cuppa, cake and chat. The plant sales were well supported.

In May we welcomed Maike Windhorst, an organic grower of many years' experience. Her subject of 'Vegetable Self Sufficiency in a Changing Climate' was very appropriate for the times we find ourselves in. Maike explained the necessity of crop rotation to eliminate the carry over of plant diseases from year to year and enthusiastically described how to grow a greater volume of vegetables from our plots.

Our speaker on WEDNESDAY 1st JUNE will be Zsuzsa Serer who will bring along a selection of herbs and tell us how to grow and use them in the kitchen.

Chair's Report



PARISH MEETING 2022.

In the past year the Parish Council has continued with its work on behalf of the community of Little Waltham.

Last year we transitioned from Zoom back to in-person meetings.

Currently we have one vacancy on the PC. Our full complement is 9 councilors. As a result of the Community Governance Review that Chelmsford City Council has undertaken, at the elections next year the size of the Parish will be reduced and the complement of councilors will reduce from 9 to 7. This is as a result of the Channels development being removed from the Parish, this will obviously affect the tax base and reduce the amount of precept that the Parish receives from residents via the City Council. I was pleased that we managed to persuade the City Council to defer the decision about the boundary between us and Broomfield that runs directly through the proposed Bloor development. The City have agreed that this will be reviewed once the houses have been built.

We have dealt with a number of issues during the course of the year - both local and city-wide.

The Local Plan is being reviewed by the City Council and this will need to be monitored closely. As a result of the Green Belt to the south of Chelmsford unfortunately our area is a prime area for further development. The City Council are calling for sites that will inform their future plans for developments.

In terms of the current Local Plan that was adopted in May 2020 one of major issues to affect the village is the proposed Bloor Homes development at the hospital. Currently Bloor are seek-ing permission for 512 houses, which is more than was allocated to this site under the Local Plan. Apart from the number of houses, one of the other issues relating to this application is the new access road to the hospital. We are fighting to have this road available for everyone visiting the hospital, at present due to an agreement that we were not a party to nor were in-formed of, the City Council would appear to have come to some sort of agreement with the hospital that this road only be for use of hospital employees and deliveries.

Another issue that comes up on a regular basis is speed of traffic and parking. We have been successful in having double yellow lines painted at the school to try to improve the parking situation at drop-off and pick-up times. The Parking Partnership have visited on several occasions to enforce the restrictions.

With regards speed of traffic we have a speed gun and a number of trained volunteers who can monitoring the speed of traffic. However as a result of the pandemic we have been unable to get out with the equipment over the past two years, however we are now able to get this up

and-running again. If you are interested in being part of this and have some time to spare please let us know.

We are also in discussions with the Highways Panel as to physical things that can be done to slow the traffic down and/or deter through traffic. One of the issues of the Bloor development is that we feel that the village will be subject to rat-running from that development from anyone heading into Chelmsford or to the A12 which will exacerbate an already difficult situation. We are trying to get the Local Highway Panel to agree to part fund a destination survey. This type of survey is the evidence that we need to persuade the Highways Panel that there is a rat-running issue, and as a result get their help in trying to deter the through traffic using the village.

There has been a further traffic issue at the Channels development in terms of large HGV lorries using the RDR to access Bulls Lodge quarry. This is necessitated as a result of the bridge being removed over Generals Lane, which allowed them to access the A12. We have lobbied Essex County Council about this issue as the noise and disruption to residents has been intolerable as the lorries start at 5.00am or earlier. We have now signed the lease on the Cricket Ground and also the pavilion. We will be consulting with the Parish about how we might use the Pavilion for the benefit of the community. There are however some works that will need to be undertaken before it can be in effect open to the public, and there are restrictions on the lease as to what use we can put it to.

The Glebe Field has been an issue that we have been concerned about during the past year. As you will be aware the tenants with the goats left the field several months ago. The Church of England are the owners of the land and we have been in discussions with them to see if the Parish Council would be able to lease it for the benefit of the community. You may also recall that there are some outstanding applications about a right of way across the land, these are still being reviewed by the City Council.

We also dealt with issues surrounding the grant of a license to operate a festival event at Wheelers Farm. Despite our submissions and those of others who were directly affected by the event and the resultant behaviour of those attending and against the advice of the Police the Licensing Committee did not agree to remove the license – they allowed the license to continue with the limit of 1,000 participants at events. Recently we have been advised of another application from a different organiser – Wheelers Farm themselves for more events this year. Once again we will make our concerns known to the Licensing Committee.

Our affordable housing project is progressing, but perhaps not as quickly as we had

hoped as a result of some legal issues. Chelmer Housing our partner in this initiative will soon be ap-plying for planning permission.

We continue producing our Parish Newsletter which is published on a quarterly basis. We are delighted that feedback continues to be very positive, and supportive of the initiative.

A lot of our time is taken up with planning applications. Most of these applications are uncontroversial, however where they are not we have made our views clear and where necessary we have attended Planning Committee and other Committee Meetings of the City Council to present our viewpoint.

Other initiatives that we arranged during the year have been the sessions of "Play in the Park" and we have recently arranged a Parish "Litter Pick". We have also engaged with both Macdonalds and Costa Coffee about the litter as much of it emanates from their customers. Both have been very responsive and have assisted in our litter picks with supplying staff to assist and

A lot of the work of the Parish Council goes on due to the commitment of my fellow councillors and I would like to thank them for all their work over the past year. I would also like to thank the other organisations on behalf of the Parish Council who do so much to the help the village and the community.

Thanks are also due to our County Councillor (and City Councillor) Mike Steel and City Councillor and Barry Knight who between them attend the majority of our meetings and are always willing to assist us and help us with City and County Council matters.

The work of the Parish Council is supported by our Clerk Suzanne and on behalf of the Parish Council I would like to thank Suzanne for all her help assistance and support over the past year. I can assure you that she works hard for the Parish and its residents. I continue to get excellent feedback from those who Suzanne has assisted she is a real asset to the Parish Council.

Sustainability



How Reducing Meat Can Make A Difference

If you've read my past pieces then you'll know my belief in that becoming more sustainable will take time, no one is perfect and by altering minor habits we can make a difference. My favourite quote remains as 'It will take millions of people living an imperfect sustainable life, rather than a few living it perfectly'



Meat consumption is a key topic when it comes to climate change contributions and in our own personal behaviours. 51% of the

UK population eats meat every day in meals; that is 34 million people. Globally, livestock farming is estimated to make up more than 14% of all man-made greenhouse gases. That is huge, but because it is huge, you may wonder what reducing one meat portion can actually achieve...can our individual actions make a difference? The answer is yes it does, but that doesn't necessarily mean we have to give it all up.

Beef produces the highest environmental footprint, largely because of the added methane that cows produce. Lamb is having the next highest, but even this impact is 50% less than beef. But getting back to the question, what does reducing one meat portion have on our individual footprints?

Reducing one 75g portion of meat in a meal would save:

- · Beef (a burger) 8kg of carbon emissions; the equivalent of travelling 18miles by car!
- · Lamb (two lamb chops) 4kg of carbon emissions; the equivalent of 34 showers!
- · 5 king prawns (farmed) 3kg of carbon emissions; the equivalent of 15 showers!
- · Pork (3 bacon rashers) 2kg of carbon emissions; the equivalent of travelling 7miles by car!
- · Fish (a single fillet) 2kg of carbon emissions; the equivalent of travelling 7miles by car!
- · Chicken (a single breast) 1kg of carbon emissions; the equivalent of 5 showers!



And that is only for one meal! If we reduced 1 meat meal per week $\,$

for a year that could save 198kg of carbon emissions. That's 330 car miles!

And that is only as us as individuals. If the 34 million Britons who eat meat everyday were to give up one meat meal a week for a year that could save 102 million tonnes of carbon emissions!

That is just one meal, one vegetable curry included in the weekly plan, and so that one small action together will make a huge difference. What meal will you change?

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Tom Amos Charity



As you walk down The Street from Ashtree Corner towards Winckford Bridge, you may have seen the Blue Plaque over 'The Old Bakery'. This is where Tom Amos lived and worked all his life.

In 1999 he set up The Tom Amos Charity, leaving it the bulk of his estate. He died in 2003, and since 2009, the Charity set up in his name, has distributed over £800,000.00 to local people and organisations. The objectives of The Charity are the provision of recreational facilities, advancement of education, relief of poverty, advancement of religion and other charitable causes



that are beneficial to the community, and covers Chelmsford City Council and the Districts of Uttlesford and Braintree. If you wish to apply for a Grant, the Application details can be found in the website as shown at the bottom of this article.

Gardening for Wellbeing The Wilderness Foundation 'Down to Earth' community allotments Hello and welcome to our 'Down to Earth Allotments'! My name is Carolin Rogers and I am the horticultural facilitator and project manager of the Wilderness Foundation UK Community Allotments. Our garden is situated within the Melbourne Park Allotment Site in Chelmsford. We work across six plots and have a distinct variety of growing space for fruit and vegetables across traditional beds, raised beds and poly tunnels combined with areas left for wildlife. Over the years, we have established a variety of small but valuable habitats to benefit our local wildlife. Organic allotment gardening goes hand in hand with a healthy environment for wildlife as those little creatures benefit our crops in so many ways. And, of course, they benefit us too! Who hasn't smiled at the little robin landing next to you on the spade handle to chirp hello and 'thank you for digging up some worms'?!

We are motivated to make growing food more accessible to a wider audience. Our allotment programme boosts and helps to maintain a healthy and positive mental attitude and supports physical health as well. Connecting people with nature through growing healthy food, activity, socializing and awareness of our beautiful environment is one of the core benefits to mental and physical wellbeing.

The Down to Earth Allotment programme is open to a range of community groups, colleges, schools and individuals. Most of our young adult volunteers are living with mental or physical disability where we can provide new opportunities for young people with complex and severe learning difficulties. Last year, we launched 'Eco Defenders' an environmental-horticultural programme for 10&11-year-old children, now running fortnightly on a Saturday morning. One of the huge benefits of being part of a wider allotment site are the social connections we have formed and treasure to this day.

We also welcome corporate volunteering groups to work in the garden. The positive effect of such initiatives on our plots and our group participants is immense!

With generous timber and compost donations and new raised beds in place, we are very pleased to now have the opportunity to work with NHS patients on the long waiting list for hip and knee replacements as well as cancer survivors. We will be able to offer a safe, sociable, productive and encouraging community space for those people with particular physical and mental needs. Currently the food grown at the allotment is shared amongst those growing it as the best way to learn where our food comes from and engage people with the subjects of nutrition and cooking. We

also donate food to the homeless charity Sanctus in Broomfield to support others in the community in need.

We continue to be grateful to our funders & donators and fantastic support given to the project by all involved. Anybody who wants to get involved with our community allotment project or is able to support us with donations, please get in touch with us as we always look for volunteers to help us maintain our plots and help our participants!

On 2nd June 2022, we celebrated another unique milestone in our history, Her Majesty The Queen's 70th year as our Monarch and Head of the Commonwealth – her Platinum Jubilee. More than 1,500 beacons were lit throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man and UK Overseas Territories, and one in each of the capital cities of Commonwealth countries in recognition of The Queen's long and selfless service. The Channels Residents Community Group kicked off the weekend of Jubilee activities taking place in the area with a beacon lighting event in Channels Park.

The event was a huge success and despite a couple of setbacks, which included our live entertainer being struck down with COVID two days before the event, lots of people attended and watched as the impressive beacon was lit at 9.45pm. It had taken over 2.5 hours to carefully load wood into the brazier (which is almost 5m high!) during the morning and the beacon burned brightly whilst the winners of the cake competition and raffle were announced.

A short video is being prepared to commemorate the journey of the Channels Beacon and a plaque marking the occasion will be added in due course. Thanks to Little Waltham Parish Council for providing funding towards the beacon and of course to all those that attended on 2nd June. The beacon is a permanent landmark feature which can be enjoyed at any time by all so if you have not yet seen it, do pop over to Channels Park!
