# How to Apply

As a registered member with NALC, the council put forward an application for the awards scheme via the website at <u>www.nalc.gov.uk</u>. (Log in is required.) Under the heading 'Our Work' / 'Improvement and Development' / Local Council Award Scheme, the form is obtained by clicking on the word 'register'. The NALC will then inform the EALC that the registration has been made. When prepared, the council confirms by resolution that it meets the necessary criteria and the EALC will forward the application form to the accreditation panel. The application is then assessed by the panel. It is EALC policy that each council will move through the levels one at a time starting with foundation and working through to quality gold.

Various activities were enjoyed by all including live music, inflatables, games, stilt walkers, a fire eater, and ferrets! Over 1500 people attended the event throughout the afternoon. Clerk to the Council, Liz Petyt Start said-"It was wonderful- the weather held and enabled our community to come together and celebrate this historical occasion. Our community attended and supported in raising over £5000 for local charities – such brilliant support for the King's 'Big help Out' day and memorable day."



#### Hullbridge Parish Council

Hullbridge Parish Council along with pupils from Riverside Primary School planted a special tree in Kendal Park to celebrate the Coronation. The Parish Council also donated each pupil a commemorative packet of sunflower seeds. The Council teamed up with Riverside PTA to run a Coronation Event for residents on the 5<sup>th</sup> May, this was a huge success and has led to an ongoing partnership for future events. In addition to this we arranged funding for both the school and the Windermere Senior Centre in Hullbridge to assist with the costs for their events.





#### Saffron Walden Town Council

The weekend of events in Saffron Walden started on Saturday morning with the Town Crier's Proclamation in the Market Square and a piece specially composed and performed by Pipe Major James Stewart. They, along with the former Town Mayor Cllr James de Vries and former Mayoress Sheila de Vries proceeded to Walden Castle. The Coronation Service was streamed live, with the Coronation Party in Jubilee Garden with Jason 'DJ Digger' Coles saw a dedicated crowd taken through the decades; it was a 'A Right Royal Knees Up! The celebrations continued on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> May with the 'Coronation Big Lunch' picnic in Jubilee Garden with live music.

The live open-air streaming of the BBC Coronation Concert with its own laser light show at Walden Castle, was a terrific evening. Personal messages were projected onto the Castle and Museum, before the laser light show adding to the occasion.



#### Woodham Walter Parish Council



Woodham Walter Parish Council arranged two very successful celebrations in the village to commemorate the Coronation of King Charles III. On the Friday, all the children from Woodham Walter Primary School joined with children from Tadpoles Nursery on Bell Meadow to receive a special Woodham Walter Coronation bookmark. They also started to fill 'Bugingham Palace', the specially commissioned Bug Hotel situated in the new area on Bell Meadow designated to become a wild flower meadow to commemorate the Coronation. It was felt that given the new King's passion for nature, wildlife and the environment, that these would be fitting reminders of an historic event.

On the Sunday of Coronation weekend, a Coronation Picnic was held at Bell Meadow. About 150 people gathered to enjoy their picnics with their friends, neighbours and family. Community Races took place including various obstacle and dressing up races, and many entrants went away with special Coronation medals.

#### Little Waltham Parish Council

Despite the rainy weather on Saturday 6th May 2023, Little Waltham Parish Council hosted a screening of the Coronation on a large screen in Taylor's Park. The bellringers from Broomfield church came along to 'ring for the King' at 9.30am on the morning of 6th May. Little Waltham Memorial Hall hosted a demonstration of line dancing as well as providing refreshments and also screening the Coronation within the hall itself. To keep the youngsters amused the pre-school arranged a fancy dress competition and Professor James came along to provide Punch and Judy shows and magic for the children! The Tufnell Hall hosted a cream tea, drinks, competitions and a bouncy castle. On Sunday 7th May the weather was much improved and the Parish Council hosted the screening of the Coronation concert from Windsor Caste on the large screen in Taylors Park which was well attended by residents.

As we all know, our Town and Parishes are the 'beating heart' of our local communities, so would really appreciate your generous support.



### **EALC** Funding Updates





#### Community Initiative Fund 2022/23 and Emergency CIF Fund

In 2022 we were pleased to once again administer The Community Initiatives Fund on behalf of Essex County Council. The funding is designed to help Parish & Town Councils, groups, clubs and voluntary sector organisations improve and support their local communities. We received a total of 94 applicants totalling £749,137 for the available fund of £300,000. Late November 2022, 27 applications were awarded a total of £170,908. The successful applicants range from Village Halls receiving awards for refurbishments and renovations to Theatre companies receiving awards towards drama and theatre projects, engaging young people.

The balance £127,092 was transferred into the CIF Emergency Fund which provides grants outside the scheduled bidding rounds. Grants are awarded on an exceptional basis on the grounds of extreme urgency. In the last year this funding supported 3 projects awarding a total of £19,690.

#### **Micro Grants Fund**

In May 2022 The Micro Grant scheme was re-launched and continued as two funds, Community Chest and Communication and Technology. Both funds were for small grants up to £500.

Community Chest Grants were available to community groups, voluntary Groups and Parish & Town Councils. Awards were given for short term projects that would have outcomes to improve the local community, wellbeing and support better connected communities. Examples of successful projects included Community Gardens, Speaking Club, Ticket office Library, Memory café. 83 successful applicants received a total of £38749.00.

Communication and Technology Grants were awarded to support grassroots organisations responding to the pandemic who had no or limited infrastructure to support communication and technology. Examples of successful projects included Website design, Broadband instalment, IT upgrade, Promotion Banners & Printing, New website. 40 successful applicants received a total of £18456.00.

### **EALC** Funding Updates





#### Ride London-Essex 2023

The world's greatest cycling event returned this year on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> May on what was its 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary. RideLondon inspires people to get active, promoting cycling as a sustainable method of transport and aiming to promote the physical and mental health benefits of exercise. On behalf of Essex County Council the EALC administrated £27575.99 to applicants to assist in supporting the event and riders.

#### Food Support and Winter Warmth Essentials Fund and The Winter Warmth and Welcome spaces Fund

Essex County Council have continued to be committed to supporting communities and those most in need who have been adversely impacted by the cost of living rises. After the success of Foodbank funding in 2021/2022, the EALC assisted Essex County Council in launching and administrating two new Funds, Food Support and Winter Warmth Essentials Fund and Winter Warmth and Welcome Spaces Fund.

Food Support and Winter Warmth Essentials Fund was launched in November 2022 and operated through to the end of March 2023. The funding was available to assist food banks, food pantries, community organisations and voluntary groups in offering vital food support and winter warmth Essential provisions to those most in need. A total of 96 applicants were awarded £312,623 which went on to support over 7500 households across Essex throughout this difficult time.

"We had no food in the cupboard and no money – My family were able to eat for the next week or 2 because of this help. The warm blankets have been a life saver as we can't afford to have the heating on and can all snuggle together in the living room as a family. It also helps to keep the animals warm too, as they love to cuddle up in them with us" Catch22



The Winter Warmth and Welcome Spaces Fund launched in October 2022 and also operated through to the end of March 2023. This fund was for smaller grants awarded to community organisations, charities, company interest companies and Parish and Town Councils. The funding was awarded for applicants to set up and run free access to all, warm, safe and supportive spaces that the residents of Essex could use throughout the winter. A total of £77800.50 was awarded to 91 applicants.

### **EALC** Funding Updates



'On behalf of the Harwich Festival, I would like to thank the EALC for this grant. It has helped us provide support to some of the most vulnerable residents in the area in the first three months of 2023.

What we did: Using this grant we have offered a weekly 'Craft Space' at the Harwich Arts & Heritage Centre. Our craft space is a free drop in activity where residents can come in and create various different artworks and have free hot drinks & healthy snacks/soup. These sessions were extremely popular with young families (our venue is next to a primary school) and the elderly.'

'A warm & comfortable lounge area to have a sense of home comforts together. As well as keeping warm, friendships and community have been built We also offered Free coats to our community.

We created another space for families and young children to play and have lots of fun.. We offered a free Stay & Play area throughout the week where we welcomed on average 80 kids per week.'
